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BISHOP'S NEW YEAR'S MESSAGE

Nurtured by Amida Buddha's Light of Wisdom and Compassion

Our Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii Theme & Slogan for 2021 is "Building Healthy Sanghas: Nurturing Empathy and Respect." It is a timely slogan especially as we begin a new year. When we take a moment to reflect on the situation of our nation and our society with the Coronavirus Pandemic, racial discrimination and even the climatic changes that are occurring on a global scale, it is not hard to see what our world needs is more respect and empathy.

The Larger Sutra provides wise consul "People in the world...should truly respect and love each other, refraining from hatred and envy. They should share things with others, refraining from greed and miserliness. They should always be friendly in speech and expression, refraining from quarrel and dispute." Unfortunately, it laments, "...people in the world...do not believe that performing good deeds brings good results, or that seeking the Way leads them to attaining it."

However, all is not lost in that the Great Compassionate Light of Amida Buddha illuminates, nurtures and unconditionally embraces the spiritually foolish being who cannot completely break free from blind passions and attain enlightenment on one's own. In the Larger Sutra it says "Sentient beings who encounter this light have the three defilements swept away, and they become soft and gentle in body and mind. They leap and dance with joy, and the good mind arises in them. When those suffering pain and travail in the three evil realms see this light, they all find respite and become free of afflictions. After their lives have ended, they will all gain emancipation."

Thus, I believe, the late Jodo Shinshu Scholar Rev. Jitsuen Kakehashi was able to say, "When we look at the world with an ordinary mind, it is distinctly divided into things we love and things we hate, but with the mind of the Tathagata, we are made to know that everyone is equally the Tathagata's indispensably important child. From that standpoint, we realize that we are all brothers and sisters and fellow human beings. Then slowly but steadily, we come to reflect on our self-centered thoughts, reject our blind passions and make efforts to see things and live our lives in a way that can be approved by the Tathagata." In this way, thanks to the Working of Other Power, we begin to slowly live in a new awareness and are assured the attainment of Enlightenment at the end of this finite life with our birth in the Pure Land.

His Eminence Gomonshu Kojun Ohtani says, "By listening to the Primal Vow and how it was established by Amida Tathagata, we are enabled to become conscious of our own ignorance and self-oriented inclinations, and through such awareness, we naturally become gentle in word and deed in our efforts of minimizing our egoistic way of thinking." "Even though our efforts may pale in comparison to the Buddha's Compassion, we are at least guided in the proper direction by the Buddha Dharma." Let us take to heart his words.

To conclude, I would like to share His Eminence's "Our Pledge." The original was written in Japanese and his expressed wish was that it be translated by each locale in a way that would resonate with the people of that region. Thus, this is Hawaii's Version (which can also be sung as it has also been put to music by BJ Soriano). In a few short verses, it captures the essence of a healthy Hongwanji Sangha which recites the Nembutsu in awareness, joy and gratitude of Great Wisdom and Compassion, and emphasizes respect and empathy.

Minister's Message

2020 passed and now we welcomed the year of 2021. Thank you very much for everything in the past year and let us go to



the Buddha, Dharma and Sangha for guidance, every day, every moment.

Every time when I welcome a new year, a story comes to my mind. That is a story of *Ikkyu*. *Ikkyu* is a zen master and the story goes in this way. In the morning of the new year, people happily and joyfully greet each other saying "Happy new year!"

People smile and feel so excited welcoming a new year. People send best wishes to each other and children play along the street. All are in the mood of happiness thinking and wishing for the bright and wonderful year. In that happy atmosphere, however, one man's presence changed everything. The man was Master Ikkyu. It is said he walked around the town saying "The New Year (or Decorative pine trees) are a milestone on the journey toward death; they are both happy and unhappy", and to our surprise, holding a cane with a skull. We can imagine how people felt and reacted to his presence and words. All the people said "How come you talked about death on this happy occasion?" "Don't say such a thing" and "don't bring and show a skull on New Year's Day! It may bring bad luck for us." Listening to the people, Master *Ikkyu* continued to walk and say the phrase again and again.

What was Master *Ikkyu*'s intention? Master *Ikkyu* reminds us of the truth of impermanence and living a life every day to the fullest. New Year's day is the dawn of "New Year" and one year is accumulated to each person's life. In other words, people are getting closer to death. Therefore, Master *Ikkyu* said New Year's Day is the day of happiness and unhappiness and taught people the truth of impermanence and the preciousness of each moment.

On New Year's Day in 2020, who imagined the COVID-19 and its impacts we had gone through? As the truth and result of causes & effects, anything can happen to our lives regardless of our wishes and desires. As a truth of life, impermanence teaches us nothing should be taken for granted and try to cherish everything we will have in this life. Sometimes, we realize the importance of things after losing them. It will be great if we can realize that importance while we have it. In *Tannisho*-A record in Lament of Divergences said:

"Further, having no thought of wanting to go to the Pure Land quickly, we think forlornly that we may die even when we become slightly ill; this also is the action of blind passions. It is hard for us to abandon this old home of pain, where we have been transmigrating for innumerable *kalpas* down to the present, and we feel no longing for the Pure Land of peace, where we have yet to be born. Truly, how powerful our blind passions are!

But though we feel reluctant to part from this world, at the moment our karmic bonds to this *Saha* world run out and helplessly we die, we shall go to that land. Amida pities especially the person who has no thought of wanting to go to the Pure Land quickly. Reflecting on this, we feel the great Vow of great compassion to be all the more trustworthy and realize that our birth is settled." (Collected Works of Shinran p.666)

A person who awakens to Buddha Wish and in that embrace, whatever happens in their lives, they are never alone. They are forever embraced and the person receives the joy of being embraced. In Amida's Embrace, our lives have a home to return when our lives come to an end. That is Pure Land. Death is not the end. It is a birth into the Pure Land to become a Buddha and meet with our loved ones again in the same place with the most beautiful appearance transcending our human calculated mind. Let us welcome the new year and live our lives to the fullest guided by Amida Buddha's Compassion and Wisdom. Let us find spiritual foundation in Namo Amida Butsu which has been calling to each of us, "take refuge in me, Amida!" and as expression of oneness with Amida and as a response, we say, Namo Amida Butsu. In Amida's embrace, we were never alone, we are never alone, we will never be alone. Life is difficult and goes as we plan, yet life is grateful with Amida buddha.


PROJECT DANA
