Minister's Message



"When you were born, you cried and the world rejoiced. Live your life so that when you die, the world cries and you rejoice."

My birthday is Amida Buddha's birthday.

Do you remember your birthday? You would say "yes of course I know." Me? Well, I think you know but my birthday is January 3rd, 1988 as a friendly reminder. Can you imagine that I have welcomed my birthday 33 times since I was born! Today we are here because we were born. Everything we have today has its beginning. And everything has a purpose for its existence. A pen is invented to write something, a car is built to drive, a TV is made to watch and so forth. In this way, when things were used according to its purpose, we can see its existence was valued and fulfilled. In

other words, if things are not used according to the original purpose, its existence is not fulfilled. We use things for different purposes sometimes though.

Here, what is the purpose of your life? Why are we born in this world? Some may say that we were born to find the purpose of life and live it. The other may say that we don't know what the purpose is but so what?! We live, we study, we work, we laugh, we cry, we enjoy each moment. What else do we need? This observation might be a common idea about our life. However, if there is a purpose of life and if it is not realized, and if our life is not according to the purpose, what do we say about this? In other words, if we realize the purpose and live it, what a wonderful life it is, isn't it? But it seems to be difficult to find a purpose of life. What is the purpose of Sakyamuni Buddha? A legend states that the prince (a baby Buddha) took 7 steps and with his right hand pointing to the heavens and his left hand to the earth proclaimed that between heaven and earth, "In the Heavens above and on the Earth below, I alone am the World-Honored One. All that exists in the Three Worlds is suffering, but I will bring comfort". Here we can find that the Buddha was born to bring comfort to all who are in fear and suffering. Buddhism teaches the 6 transmigrations of suffering of life & death and offers the 7th step to liberate all from this cycle of birth and death. The 7th step is Buddha's teaching which leads to enlightenment. Buddha's entire life was to preach the teachings to all to alleviate suffering and bring the utmost bliss of enlightenment to all. We can see that the Sakyamuni Buddha had a purpose of life, lived it, and the purpose was fulfilled through each person receiving the teaching and attaining enlightenment. About the birth of Sakyamuni Buddha, Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jodo Shinshu Tradition said in this way: "Sakyamuni Tathagata (Buddha) appeared in this world Solely to teach the ocean-like Primal Vow of Amida; We, an ocean of beings in an evil age of five defilements, Should entrust ourselves to the Tathagata's words of truth."-Collected Works of Shinran, Shoshinge.

Although there are many, many teachings and schools based on it, Shinran Shonin understood that Sakyamuni Buddha was born to teach the Primal Vow of Amida which embraces all unconditionally and saves all from suffering. Then, Shinran Shonin also says that our purpose is to listen to the teaching and entrust ourselves to the Vow of Amida Buddha. And the object and target of the Compassionate embrace of Amida Buddha is me and you. Sakyamuni Buddha and Amida Buddha were born to meet me, to guide me, to embrace, and urge me to take refuge in the ultimate reliance so we can attain enlightenment free from struggles, pains, ego and attachments. Don't you think we feel a kind of astonishment, excitement, wonder, and rejoice? The purpose and reasons for the existence of Amida Buddha is for the sake of me.

Miyoko Gyoren Nozawa said, "although the umbilical cord is cut, a permanent attachment remains." A birth is beautiful but that is the beginning of the life that promises sickness, aging, death and all kinds of struggles in our life. Because our life is full of struggles and pains, Amida Buddha can't stop thinking of us. How dare your loved one leave you alone when you are sad, lonely and need help? In the similar way, observing our human endurance, Amida Buddha's Compassionate vows were established to embrace us and guide us with the Great Wisdom. Touched by Amida Buddha' Vigorous Compassion, we can find comfort and assurance in the awareness that no matter what Amida Buddha is with us. Touched by the Transcending Wisdom, we are enabled to see our true human nature of greed, anger, ignorance and we are nurtured to live life not being driven by our ego but guided by the wisdom of Amida Buddha.

When we are exposed to the Vow of Amida Buddha and awaken to the Compassion and Wisdom, the mind of entrusting erupts in our life which urges us to place our hands together in gassho, causes us to recite the Name of Amida Buddha, Namo Amida Butsu in gratefulness and humbling joy. Indeed, I was born to be embraced by Amida Buddha and Amida Buddha was born to embrace me. How beautiful it is, isn't it? You have someone who thinks of you more than you do for yourself. Amida Buddha is the one who is compassionately calling to us saying "Don't worry, be happy. I shall embrace you as you are no matter what" even before we ask and even before we know it. Let us joyfully and gratefully recite the Name together. Namo Amida Butsu.
