Minister's Message

Bittersweetness

I and my beautiful spouse Haruka would like to take this opportunity to express our deepest appreciation to all of you for your kindness, generosity, support, time, cooperation and patience you have shared with us for our wedding ceremony (renewal of vows) and reception. Without your support, we would not have been able to welcome this day. Thank you very much for your seen and unseen dedications. Unfortunately, the groom got COVID-19 a few days before and had to attend the ceremony and reception via TV screen to isolate himself. When I found myself positive, I thought "why!", "why now?", "not fair!", "I must have gotten the virous

form that person or that meeting"! It is their fault!", it was like an end of life to me. However, as I saw Haruka tireless working and preparing for the wedding and observing members' support, I couldn't simply remain shocked and sorrow. They guided to understand and accept the reality and led me to do what I can do. I still have a feeling of regret, guilty, mind of should have done/shouldn't have done. But, as it is said you can't change the past but you can only reflect and learn from the past, I get to accept it as it is, which is hard though. Buddhism taught me that life doesn't always go as I wish and it is me who receive its consequences of trying to make things go as I plan. The gap between the reality and my wish is the cause of struggles and the only thing that I can change is my wish. In other words, I get to understand the reality and accept it acknowledging my wish and desires. The Larger Sutra says, "...they themselves receive their due consequences and no one can take their place." The sentence of "No one can take their place" was harsh to me but was true words. I blamed others for getting positive, I tried to ignore the reality, I lamented, I wanted to sweep it under the rug, but it didn't work. Rather, the more I tried to behave in that way, something gave me alert and drew me from there to a different realm. That was the true & real of Namo Amida Butsu.

It literally means I take refuge in the Buddha of immeasurable life and light. Another way of saying is I take refuge in the Buddha of infinite compassion and wisdom. The Amida Buddha's Great Wisdom is insight to see everything as it is and reveal the truth to me. Touched by wisdom, I am enabled to see my way of reacting to things and it leads me to observe things not through my wish or desires but guided by the Wisdom. Touched by the Amida Buddha's Vigorous Compassion, I made aware of the joy of being embraced by its warmth and the comfort of not being left alone.

Although I say Namo Amida Butsu, it is actually a calling and commanding voice of Amida Buddha: "Come to my embrace. Whatever happens in your life, I'm here for you, I shall guide you. Come as you are!" When I was facing a harsh reality of catching covid, I was lost, I was sad, I was shocked, and I was driven by my selfish ideas and self-interest. However, therefore, for such as me and because of me, Amida Buddha can't stop but calling to me and reaching out to me. When I receive and hear the Name of Namo Amida Butsu, I am in the embrace of Great Compassion and Great Wisdom which resonates in my life. Still, I'm sure that I will go through so many ups and downs. Like a metronome returns to its center after swinging to either side, no matter and whatever I may face, I can return to my home of life where Buddha accepts, understands and embrace me. Life is bittersweet but life is beautiful with Amida Buddha.

Approved Activities/Announcements

- Board approved for Rev. Tomioka to purchase a portable Butsudan Buddha Altar. New online equipment, microphones, laptop computer, etc. were purchased also.
- The Peace Committee organized the folding, sewing, and creating of the four mobiles (1,000 cranes each) which were given to Mayor Mitch Roth's Office on September 12. 4,000 cranes were delivered from PHM Kyodan, BWA, Sr. YBA, and Peace Committee for the County of Hawaii Peace Week.
