Minister's Message

Mr. Fred Nonaka who is a former president of State Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii shared a story with me once and here is adapted version.

Every morning I have coffee. When I open a coffee can, I can see the seal which keeps the coffee fresh. When I peel this seal, I can smell the coffee. Good smell! Usually, I use one or two spoonfuls of coffee and pour hot water into my cup and then wait a few minutes, until the coffee is ready to drink. In a few weeks, half the coffee in the can will be gone. The amount of coffee becomes less and less. As it gets closer to end, I measure each spoonful and enjoy the taste. With the last spoonful of coffee, I try to use all of it and really enjoy the taste.... You may have the same

experience.

In a similar way, we are first born as babies. We spend our days, growing, learning and living our lives. When a life comes to the middle point, we think we still have a lot of time and we spend time on doing the things we have to do. And then we realize that we are getting old and we stop to think, "What is my life? Have I done what I really want to do?" Here, what we now have, is time to live, that we can think of, a spoonful at a time or moment by moment.

We can find several messages in this story.

First of all, our lives are impermanent. Even if we think we still have plenty of time, the time when we say goodbye to this world certainly comes to everybody without exception. Therefore, "our lives are impermanent" means that each day, every moment become precious and beautiful. We can appreciate today, and the life we are living right now. Let's each make today a precious and meaningful day.

Secondly, this story tells us that the attitude we have each day is important. In our lives, there are many things we have to do, working, learning, family, friends, raising children, having fun... we spend our time on these things. These are important things. I'm not saying that you have to give up these thing. Rather, we can make our daily lives meaningful by adding an essence of Buddhism. It is not easy to change a life style and routines in which we feel comfortable. We don't need to change our life style. If we change our attitude toward living and if we learn to appreciate each thing, then, without changing our life style, our lives are enriched with greater meaning.

It is not easy to be mindful of "a meaningful life" 24 hours a day. Our ideas and attitudes easily and conveniently change depending on the situation. However, there is a thing which always awakens us to a meaningful life. It is unchanging, full of compassion and unconditional love, and always embraces our entire lives. That is Amida Buddha's boundless compassion and wisdom. We are enabled to live our lives to the fullest.

Here, once again let's think about our life. As we have received a gift of life, it promises that we will have the moment when we say good bye to this world. What will happen to me when I welcome end of life? Jodo Shinshu tradition teaches us that the time when we say good bye to this world is the time we become a Buddha, the enlightened one in the Land of Buddha, begin to work for the sake of happiness for others left in this world. It is here and now that we are assured of becoming a Buddha when we say good bye to this life. It is not the moment of death or not after the death, but here and now, when we are awakened to Amida Buddha's Primal Vow that assures our birth in the Pure Land. That vow is Namo Amida Butsu. Shinran Shonin said,

"Those who attain true and real shinjin/entrusting heart immediately join the truly settled; thus having entered the stage of nonretrogression, they necessarily attain nirvana" ("Hymns of the Pure Land, CWS. p.341")

When we hear the compassionate calling voice of Amida Buddha "Come to my embrace! Whatever happens in your life, I shall never ever let you go alone!" and receive it without doubt, that is shinjin/entrusting heart to the vow. Since the shinjin is arose through the Primal Vow of enlightenment, it can become the cause of birth in the Pure Land. And we receive the warm embrace that gives us joy and comfort in our life.

We cannot become a Buddha now because we have an imperfect self. However, we can live our lives meaningfully guided by Buddha and no matter what happens, Amida Buddha embraces us. So, in our Jodo Shinshu tradition, it is really important to listen to the Dharma which is Amida Buddha's wish for each of us. Amida Buddha's wish has already been with you. It is up to each of us, how we respond to this Buddha's wish and how we live our lives. It is important to appreciate each thing and live our lives to the fullest as we enjoy a cup of coffee every day. We can live only today and today is the day when Amida Buddha's wish embraces us and never abandons us, no matter what happens.

Message of Congratulations and Appreciation

On behalf of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, it is my honor to extend my deepest congratulations and appreciation to the Members, Supporters and Friends of Puna Hongwanji Mission as you celebrate your 120th Anniversary.

When I think of the number 120, it makes me think of Shinran Shonin's "Hymn of True Shinjin and the Nembutsu" (Shoshinge) which he composed to express the essence of Jodo Shinshu in 120 lines. In the preface to the Hymn, Shinran Shonin shares his reason for writing the Shoshinge. He says "...wishing to realize the Buddha's benevolence and to respond in gratitude to the Buddha's virtue" and "I realize the depth and vastness of the Buddha's benevolence and compose the following hymn." He purposely begins it with the conclusion, "I take refuge in the Tathagata of Immeasurable Life!" and "I entrust myself to the Buddha of Inconceivable Light!" or taking refuge in Amida Buddha.

Similarly, I believe, the Sangha of Puna Hongwanji has for the past 120 years, out of gratitude, continued to gratefully share the Joy of the Nembutsu with family, friends and neighbors. I would like to commend you for realizing our purpose as stated in our Hongwanji Constitution, "The organization transmits the wisdom and compassion of Amida Tathagata to all people, and in doing so, contributes to the realization of a society in which everyone, both within and outside of the organization, is able to live a life of spiritual fulfillment." and as His Eminence Kojun Ohtani said, "In reflecting on the present circumstance of our organization, it is significantly important to consider how we can approach and reach out to persons who have never had any contact with a Buddhist temple, as well as those who are already involved with one." "Let us...cope with (the) various problems and hardships of the contemporary world, walking together towards realizing a society in which everyone is equally respected."

As we move into the future, facing old challenges and setting new goals, may we continue to respond in gratitude to Amida Buddha's Unparalleled Compassion and be guided by the Dharma as did our predecessors in the tradition of the gatha Ondokusan, (translated by our Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii Music Committee as), "By the Benevolence of Amida's Light, How in utmost we entrust deep thanks express; For our debt to teachers for their guidance true, We dedicate ourselves in gratefulness."

To close, I, once again, express my deepest gratitude to past, present and future Members, Supporters and Friends including Ministers and their Spouses of Puna Hongwanji for their dedication and support of the Temple and the state-wide Honga Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii. Thank you.

- Board approved Rev. Tomioka's proposal to do flower arrangement class one time a month for ten months. Instructor is from Honolulu and class will be open to Puna community.
- Board approved sponsoring the pack flag for the scouts.
- Board approved to provide take out hot meals on Thanksgiving Day using Social Concerns Fund.
- The State Social Concerns Committee gave PHM money for the pandemic and eruption. The envelope we received is a way of replenishing their account.
- All Nations Pow Wow donated money to PHM for use of our facilities.
- Dues donation reminders will be sent out by end of month.
- Board was informed that this was not a good year for investments. The year to date return is in the negative, however, we were reminded that this is a long term investment and to not get too excited about its short term activity.
