Minister's Message

How do you envision yourself in 2023? Perhaps, what we want for this new year might be peace, happiness, health, safety, harmony, understanding, respect, and so forth as we've been through tough times these past years.

According to the truth of life, things don't always go as we wish, and everything is changing depending on the causes & conditions. Struggles occur from our own denial of the truth. Truth is something that we are eager to know or we don't want to know. If a tragic event happens, what we want to know is the truth. Or if someone is trying to reveal some inconvenient truth about us, we may want to sweep it under the carpet. However, no matter how much we try to change or hide it, the truth is always

there in front of our eyes whether we like it or not.

Buddhism is the religion founded by the awakened one who understands the truth and who guides all to live with that truth. It is called the Dharma-the universal teaching which causes us to know the truth of life & ourselves and leads us to the way of enlightenment. Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jodo Shinshu Pure Land Buddhism Tradition understands this truth as Amida Buddha's Primal Vow. Amida Buddha, the Buddha of Vigorous Compassion and Transcending Wisdom, pledged to embrace all and lead us to attain enlightenment in the Pure Land, and guide us to return to the delusional human world to navigate those who left behind to the path of truth. Compassion is loving-kindness & loving-concern for me who are going through so many ups and downs. Wisdom is a lighthouse that gives me direction, warmth, and the light.

When I was young, I was a Kolohe/rascal boy. I always had a minor cut and injuries. Every time when I fell and cut my knees, I cried. Hearing my crying voice, my mother came to me and embraced me saying, "My boy. It's okay, it's okay, I'm here for you." In her embrace, I continued crying but somehow found comfort although the pain was still there. The comfort arose because I know that somebody acknowledges my pain, someone understands my situation, and someone cares about me.

Amida Buddha's Wisdom teaches me that pain is inevitable. Life naturally brings me all kinds of pains including illness, aging, death, separation from loved ones, meeting with someone we don't like, not getting what we want, and pains derived from body and mind. The more I tried to escape from this fact, the more I suffered. Only when I admit that pain is part of my life, and only when I understand the suffering arises because of my ignorance to this truth, acceptance of my pains erupts in my life.

Amida Buddha's Compassion is truly with me always, even when I try to ignore, avoid and can't accept the truth of "pain is inevitable". Buddha's compassion is described as "Your happiness is my happiness, your suffering is my suffering." There is no distinction between us but only togetherness and oneness with Amida Buddha. In that embrace, when I realize that there is someone who acknowledges my pain, who is with me, who guides my life, who understands my emotions and struggles, I find comfort. Indeed, once embraced, never forsaken by Amida Buddha.

Shinran Shonin says, --"The light of compassion illumines us from afar; those beings it reaches, it is taught, attain the joy of dharma, so take refuge in Amida, the great consolation"." *great consolation: A name of Amida. All the sorrows, griefs, and evils of sentient beings are eliminated and they are comforted.--

Like a caring and concerned hand is offered to embrace the pain and joy, Amida Buddha is always here for us saying: "Whatever happens in your life, I shall embrace you. Come to my embrace, take refuge in me, Amida!" Hearing this calling and receiving the mind of Buddha, an entrusting heart (shinjin) erupts in me, and Namo Amida Butsu comes out from my mouth, with the mind of gratefulness and humbling joy for the Amida Buddha's benevolence.

In 2023, and every day, every moment, let us continue to listen to the Dharma. And let us find comfort in the compassionate embrace and let us take refuge in the wisdom who dispels the ignorance and guides us to be aware of the joy of Nembutsu.

私は小さいころから悪坊主で、いつも新しい傷を作っていました。転んで膝を擦りむいて泣く私に、 母親はいつもぎゅっと抱きしめて、「痛かったね、大丈夫、大丈夫」と言ってくれました。母の胸の 中で、痛みがそこにはありながら、どこか安心していたことを覚えています。それはきっと、私の痛 みを理解して、分かってくれる人がいる、私のことを心配して思ってくれている人がいるからだった のだと思います。

阿弥陀様の慈悲とは、私たちの苦悩をまるごと抱きとって、どんなことがあっても私を孤独にさせないあたたかい心です。阿弥陀様の智慧とは、思うようにいかない人生を自分の思うようにしようとしている私の姿を見抜き、真実へと向かわせる道しるべです。

A gathering at the temple with Amida Buddha as its center provides a great opportunity to receive the Dharma as well as an occasion in which people can support and reassure one another as fellow practicers who follow the same teaching.

I hope you will continue to share the teaching within the greater society through various ways and your temple will or continue to serve as a place where people can gather and find comfort in its activities. I humbly ask for your understanding and cooperation in support of your temples. I would like to conclude my new year's greeting with my heartfelt appreciation to you all.

In the words of Mitsuo Aida, whose calligraphy piece for Gan (or Negai in vernacular Japanese) is reproduced here, he says very different from personal wishes centered only on oneself are wishes such as: may there be no wars, aspiring for peace and harmony in the world, and may our human contrivances not contribute further to the contamination of our natural environment of the land, sea, and air. When we sincerely embrace these sorts of wishes, they are referred to as "Gan" (or aspirations or vows). If held deeply in our hearts, even the tiniest aspiration will be reflected in our eyes and faces. May we embrace vows and aspirations within our means and contribute to a brighter prospect for our future.



When I look at Mitsuo Aida's calligraphy above, I am reminded of Amida Buddha's 48

Vows especially the Great Compassion of Amida Buddha which promises "If those who entrust themselves to my Vow should not be born [in my (Pure) land], I shall not become Buddha." which expresses Amida Buddha great aspiration by conditioning the Buddha's own Supreme Enlightenment with the Enlightenment of all others including you and me. Could there be a greater wish or aspiration? Please reflect on this matter.

Further, let us make manifest our Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii Theme & Slogan for 2023 which is "Building Healthy Sanghas: Sharing Joy Together." As Shinran Shonin rejoiced in one of his poems, *The light of compassion illumines from afar; Those beings it reaches, it is taught, Attain the Joy of the Dharma, So take refuge in Amida, the great consolation.*

Do not keep that joy and happiness of the Nembutsu hidden within you. As we look back on our journey for the past few years, let us express our appreciation to our ministers and temple leaders for their dedication, resilience and creativity in sharing the Nembutsu teachings with our community under difficult circumstances.
