Minister's Message

My spouse Haruka and I enjoy driving and shopping together whenever we have time. Especially, we often go to a newly opened store Daiso where we tend to purchase lots of things. Since Daiso is located next to Ben Franklin Store and they share the space under the same building, there is an accessible area so people can go to either store. One day, when I was shopping, a young child was standing on that area saying "I'm standing on the floor of both stores!" Perhaps, nobody paid attention to his words except me. It was an interesting and thought-provoking observation he had. It is true that he entered and existed on the two different stores at the same time while we can usually enter only one store at one time. You may wonder that why I'm talking about this and what is the point.

Here is the thing. In Buddhism, the human world where we are living is called "This Shore"/*Saha* World which is life of endurance and struggles caused by delusions and attachments. On the other hand, Buddha's land is called "Other Shore where only beauty, harmony, purity, excellence, peace, perfection, compassion, and all the supreme virtues and merits exist. The goal of Buddhism is to reach to this shore of the Buddha's realm and we attain enlightenment freed from tears and difficulties. In order to cross to the Other Shore, there are various practices to perform and it creates different traditions of Buddhism. So the question is can we exist in the realm of this shore and other shore at the same time? In Jodo Shinshu tradition and teaching, we will come to the stage of being assured to be born in the Pure Land of Other Shore at the end of life through the working of Amida Buddha's vow while we are on this shore of human life. In other words, we are still not yet in the Other Shore, but we will be guaranteed to be there and its assurance is settled today, right here, right now when Amida Buddha's wish is reaching our heart and mind.

What is Amida Buddha's wish? It is aspiration to liberate all from sufferings and bring all to the Other Shore of Pure Land. We are supposed to purify our hearts and minds, perform all the practices, accumulate merits and virtues for our enlightenment. However, Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jodo Shinshu tradition realized that it is impossible for him to liberate himself from sufferings as his heart and mind was never separated from self-centeredness and desires. That was the moment for Shinran Shonin to encounter the wish calling out to him "Come to my embrace! I shall liberate you as you are!" Shinran Shonin said,

Entrust yourself to Amida's Primal Vow.

Through the benefit of being grasped, never to be abandoned,

All who entrust themselves to the Primal Vow

Attain the supreme enlightenment.-Hymns of the Dharma-Ages, #1

All the necessary virtues and merits were accumulated by Amida Buddha and it was bestowed to Shinran Shonin as Namo Amida Butsu. Without Amida Buddha's vow, we would have continued to stay on this shore of struggles forever and afterlife too. But, a person who encounters this vow will be assured to cross to the Other Shore from This Shore and live a life of gratefulness, humility, and reflection guided by Amida Buddha's All-Inclusive Wisdom and All-Embracing Compassion.

On March 26, we will observe spring Ohigan (Other Shore) Service to gratefully appreciate the vow that saves me from this shore and assures my birth in the Pure Land of Other Shore. Touched by the Wisdom and Compassion, we are enabled to understand and acknowledge where we are (this shore of struggles), why we are here (because of our human desires and self-centeredness), where we go (Other Shore of Pure Land), how to get there (through the working of the Vow/assurance occurs today, right here, right now), when we go to the Other Shore (at the moment of last breath), and who (yes, it is me).

As the conclusion, I would like to share the words of wisdom of Rev. Sosuke Nishimoto.
*This world is not the Pure Land.
Yet, the gate to the Pure Land is
Open.
In this Saha world, in this reality,
In front of our eyes at the one thought moment.
I tell you once again to make sure you understand
There is no entrance to the Pure Land
After this life.*

Let us hear and listen to the voice of Amida Buddha who is compassionately calling and commanding to us:
“Come to my embrace. I shall liberate you as you are!”

扉がガタガタしている、ふすまがガタピシする、という表現があります。この「ガタガタ」と「ガタピシ」の漢字はご存じでしょうか。それぞれ我他我他、我他彼此、と書かれ、仏教に由来する言葉と言われています。我と他人、彼と此れ、という違う存在がぶつかり合って調和のない様子を表すところからきているそうです。この「彼此」を用いる言葉に彼岸、此岸があります。彼岸とは、さとりの世界で、全てが穏やかで清らかな仏さまの境界です。此岸とはその反対で、私たち人間が住む世界で、苦悩に満ち溢れた処で娑婆（シャバ）とも呼ばれます。よく、ドラマなどで服役後に「ああ、娑婆の空気は上手いなー」という表現があります。刑務所という囚われの世界から自由である社会に出たという意味で用いられていますが、本来の娑婆は忍土と呼ばれる、様々なことに耐え忍び、また他の人を耐え忍ばせざるを得ない人間のいのちの在り方を示しています。

この此岸にガタピシと住む私たちの姿をご覧になり、必ず平穏な安穩としたいのちにして、彼岸のお浄土に迎えとりたいという願いを建てられたのが、阿弥陀様なのです。本来ならば、自分の力で清く正しく美しい言葉、行動、心を整えて、彼岸に生まれていくのですが、浄土真宗を開かれた親鸞聖人は、私の心はほんの数分でも完全に穏やかになることはない、と深く悲しまれました。「人間、みんな裁判官。他人は有罪、自分は無罪」という言葉にあるように、自分の都合でものごとを見てうまくいけば喜び、都合が悪ければ苦悩するのが私です。その私を必ず救うために、想像がつかないほどの時間、修行、思いをかけて仏になり、今私の前にいてくださるのが阿弥陀様なのです。「あなたを必ず救います」という願いが南無阿弥陀仏なのです。此岸にいて苦悩する私を必ず彼岸のお浄土へと生まれさせたいという、願いです。

3月26日の春のお彼岸法要では、この仏様の願いを聞かせていただきましょう。私はどこにいるのか（此岸）、なぜここにいるのか（煩惱による）、どこへ向かうのか（彼岸・お浄土）、どうやって往くのか（阿弥陀様の本願力・ご信心をいただいて）、いつ往くのか（最後の息を吸うとき）、誰が往くのか（この私）を考えさせていただきましょう。

「そのまま まかせよ 必ず救うよ 親だからね」のお念仏のお換ひ声です。

- The temple held its first Scout Sunday! Thank you to Cub Scout Pack 67 for participating! The kids are growing quickly and will soon be transitioning to the Scout Troop. We are pleased to be sponsoring an additional girls troop in the future!
- Temple security is an on-going process but we now have a plan to make some improvements around the property. We hope to provide a safe environment while continuing to be a welcoming temple. Mahalo everyone for your suggestions, insight, and assistance!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

President's message

The 111th Legislative Assembly or Giseikai was held on February 10th and 11th both in person and online.

Thank you to Reverend Tomioka, Robin Sato and Richard Solie who also attended as delegates.

The Legislative Assembly ratified the selection of the new Bishop who will be Reverend Toshiyuki Umitani of Moiliili Hongwanji. His term will begin in July.

Green Hongwanji Action Plan was referred back to the Board of Directors for adoption and implementation.

The committee is asking for input so if you would like to see the plan please let me know. Also, if you would like to see the Annual Report of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii I can email it to you.

We approved a Resolution to designate 2024 as the year to celebrate the 850th anniversary of the birth of Shinran Shonin, the 800th anniversary of the establishment of the Jodo Shinshu teaching and the 135th Anniversary of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii.

We also voted to approve a Communications Coordinator Position to help the Business manager and passed a resolution of Condolence and Appreciation for Reverend Midori Kondo, David Ikawa, June Uyeno and Sadao Aoki.

We also approved the budget for 2023 and because of a reduction in the transfer from the capital fund due to losses, not having the PPP loan from the federal government and the funding of the new position for half the year the assessment to the temples has risen to \$600,499 from last year's \$358,145. Because the allocation is based on the membership, Puna Hongwanji's share will be approximately \$32,747 which is approximately \$150 per member which we pay to the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii. Our Puna Hongwanji Budget for 2023, shows an assessment of \$19,176. Because of this increase, we will be facing a tough year financially so we will need to boost our income somehow.

We will be having our first Shinnen Enkai since 2020 in conjunction with our Ohigan service on March 26th.

We will be also honoring our Keirosha at that time so I hope to see you all there.
