Minister's Message

OUT OF ORDER

There are 26 letters in the alphabet, but the words composed of those letters are countless, and new ones continue to emerge. It's fascinating to consider that for those who understand a language, words convey information and meaning. However, for those who don't, words remain mere symbols, devoid of significance. Often, we read words without much thought, but there's a profound discovery awaiting us if we take the time to ponder their meaning and depth. Consider the words that bring you happiness: 'I love you,' 'Lunch is ready,' and 'I hit the jackpot.' Conversely, think about words that evoke sadness, such as 'I hate you' or 'You look ugly.' Another word that aptly describes today's world and society is 'chaos.' Uncertainty pervades everywhere. Now, let's reflect on its opposite: 'order.' Other words like 'calm' and 'harmony' also describe what life looks like when things are not chaotic. When our lives are in order, it signifies health, alignment with our goals, and a sense of well-being.



However, there are moments when life feels out of order—when a bathroom sign reads 'out of order,' or a vending machine, ATM, or door displays the same inconvenient message.

Now, if our life is 'out of order,' let's contemplate it more deeply. This disorderliness could manifest as work-related stress due to human relationships or structural issues, health problems that disrupt our smooth functioning, separations from loved ones or sources of pleasure, or even inconvenient moments like having no internet connection when we need it most. In these situations, we often feel devastated, uncomfortable, and disappointed because they are beyond our control and contrary to our wishes and hopes. However, let's consider this from the perspective of Buddhist teachings. Is it truly 'out of order'? While a malfunctioning bathroom or other objects may indeed be 'out of order,' the disorder of life actually follows its own inherent order. When health issues arise, our initial desire is for perfect health and the absence of illness. Yet, everything in life is impermanent, constantly changing, and nothing remains static. Therefore, experiencing health issues is not truly 'out of order'; it aligns with the fundamental truth of existence. It is our perception that labels it as such because it doesn't match our personal wishes. Anything can happen to anyone at any time, but what we often think is 'not today,' 'not to me,' and 'not what I want.' Life, however, can surprise us with unexpected twists and turns. By shifting our perspective, we recognize that life's experiences are filtered through our own perceptions. When circumstances don't align with our desires, we label them 'out of order' and suffer. Similarly, that bathroom with an 'out of order' sign is actually in order—it's unavailable due to specific causes and conditions; everything is changing.

Amida Buddha's wisdom guides us to recognize that life unfolds as it is, and our suffering arises when we resist this natural flow and insist on our own desires. Acceptance doesn't mean tolerating unbearable circumstances; rather, it involves understanding the fundamental truths of existence. When faced with harsh realities that seem 'out of order,' we can feel the unwavering presence of Amida Buddha's compassionate embrace—a warmth that accepts all just as they are. Our deepest wish is to experience pleasure and avoid loss. Yet, Amida Buddha's wisdom and compassion offer a different perspective—one that allows us to see life clearly, beyond our personal preferences. Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha Pure Land tradition, eloquently expressed this: ***'The light of compassion illumines us from afar; those beings it reaches attain the joy of dharma. So take refuge in Amida, the great consolation.'*** (Hymns of the Pure Land, #10) As we navigate life's pains and struggles, compassion reaches out to embrace and guide us. Amida Buddha's voice calls to us: 'Come to my embrace; I am here for you always.' The heartfelt recitation of 'Namo Amida Butsu' overflows, reminding us that we are not alone—we find ourselves in Amida's embrace. This assurance extends to our birth in the Pure Land, reuniting with loved ones, and returning to guide those left behind in this world through the working of Amida Buddha's Primal Vow. Let us remember that even when life feels 'out of order,' Amida Buddha remains with us, unwavering and compassionate.

人生には三つの坂があるといわれます。上り坂、下り坂、まさか、です。苦楽は人生につきものですが、思いもしないことが起こるとき、私たちのいのちは大きく揺さぶられます。ラハイナの火事、地震、病気など予想外のことが起こるとまさに、「まさか」となります。実は、しかし、仏教の観点からすると人生には「まさか」はありません。それは、全てのものは移り変わり、何一つ、誰一人とも変わらずにいることはないからです。人生は因と縁によって変わりますが、私たちは変わって欲しくないとは強く願うばかりに、それによって私たちは涙を流し辛さを味わいます。阿弥陀様の智慧によって人生の真理を知らされます。よく「仕方がない」といいますが、これは匙を投げるとか、ギブアップではなく、あきらめること、つまり「諦らかに真実を見る」ことを言います。辛く悲しいことをただただ受け入れるというのではなく、それが人生の真実なのだとして理解することです。それでも、大事な人との別れは耐え難く、生きる意味を見失います。そんなとき、阿弥陀様の慈悲が私の心に灯ります。あなたの涙、あなたの痛み、あなたの悔しさ、あなたのやるせない思い、その一つ一つ一緒に感じて一緒にいてくださる暖かさです。孤独にはさせない、必ず救うと喚びかけてくださっているのがなもあみだつ、お念仏です。「まさか」はいつ起こるか分かりませんが、どんなことがあってもどんなあなたになっても、決して見捨てない、あきらめない、嫌わないと誓ってくださった南無阿弥陀仏とともに生かさせていただきますましょう。お念仏の世界に別離はありません。いつも、いつでも、いつまでも、一緒です。「大悲無倦常照我」阿弥陀様の大いなる慈悲のお心は、休むことなくいつも私のいのちを照らしてくださる。一親鸞聖人

In recent weeks and months, Puna Hongwanji has been fortunate to have been graced with the presence of a new attendee, Ms. Sarah Kay. Sarah has enjoyed coming to our services, has attended BWA meetings, has even helped out with making chili for the BWA Childrens' Day Fundraiser, and has also enjoyed singing with the Puna Hongwanji Choir.

When Sarah finished fifth grade, her family moved from Granada Hills, CA to Oahu. She grew up on Oahu. She and her eight siblings, all under the age of thirteen, lived just a few minutes' walk from the ocean, close to both the Waikiki Natatorium and Kapiolani Park. Sarah was the third oldest child, with a love for the outdoors and a natural ease with the young ones. She led many a Saturday morning journey away from the house so that mom and dad could sleep in.



Sarah raised four children (all born in Hawaii) and spent a few years on the mainland in the early part of her marriage. Kauai was home for a short time, but when Iniki hit the island in 1992, it disrupted life there and the family moved to the Hilo area.

Her marriage did not survive, and ended in 2004. Christianity had replaced Catholicism in her life, and until her youngest graduated from high school in 2014, the rituals and church calendar gave cadence to her life. Christianity provided no further solace however when she was faced with her empty nest. The youngest had left home without even a goodbye. Single, bereft, she immersed herself in nature at every opportunity. Mindfulness and focused breathing became her helpmate.

Last December, she came to temple to ask about the Japanese good luck paper she'd seen at Foodland. Although she'd grown up with some Japanese friends, she'd never heard of this New Year's paper. The next day would be the old year out-new year in service at the Puna Hongwanji, and she came to temple for it. Sarah has attended regularly ever since.
