This assurance of not being alone is a profound comfort, affirming that we are part of a larger compassionate existence.

This understanding shifts our perspective on life. We are not merely living to age, fall ill, and pass away. Instead, we are living to become part of this true compassion, which will be with us until our last breath. Every up and down in life is part of this journey, and we are supported by Great Compassion and Wisdom. The original wish and source of this support is Amida Buddha's Primal Vow, *Namo Amida Butsu*. When we recite *Namo Amida Butsu*, it is a proof to the love of Amida Buddha touching our lives. It signifies a deep connection that blooms within us. Hearing *Namo Amida Butsu* is like a warm embrace, assuring us of our birth in the Pure Land and attainment of enlightenment. It is a vow that cares for us, protects us, worries for us, wishes for us, and loves us. Being touched by such love naturally leads us to enjoy it, reflect on our lives, and be guided to live according to that love. It is a journey of embracing and sharing the compassion that has been bestowed upon us. We are never alone in this embrace.

The month of November is a special time for reflecting on gratitude. Our Eitaikyo observance and Thanksgiving holiday are opportunities to appreciate the innumerable causes and conditions which sustain our lives and how we are deeply connected to the world around us. It is in this spirit of profound gratitude that we kick-off our Annual Social Concerns Fund Drive.

Your generosity enables the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii with the ability to support worthy organizations and programs making positive impacts in our community. Your selfless giving also enables us to provide compassionate aid during times of disaster and the ability to skillfully respond to issues affecting our local and world communities.

Through an overwhelming outpouring of support, we raised almost \$1 million through our Maui Wildfire Disaster Relief Fund and distributed over \$300,000 to support the members of Lahaina Hongwanji and the Maui community in the aftermath of the devastating wildfires of August 2023. We will continue to lend our support on their long road to recovery.

So far this year, we have continued our support for improving mental health care, building community resiliency, and humanitarian aid in Gaza as well as relief efforts in Japan in the aftermath of the Noto Peninsula Earthquake. We have made donations to organizations such as the Samaritan Counseling Center Hawaii, Vibrant Hawaii, and World Central Kitchen.

We continue to award Golden Chain Grants to help nurture Sangha-based compassionate action and launched the Dana Matching Grant Program to multiply the impact of charitable giving by organizations in the Hawaii Kyodan Ohana. We hope you will take advantage of these innovative programs that help to share our values in the wider community.

The fund drive will begin November 1, 2024, and run till August 31, 2025. We request that temples submit their collected donations by the end of September 2025. Envelopes have been provided to temples wishing to use them. Extra envelopes are available in limited supply. Please make all checks payable to Puna Hongwanji. Your temple will then remit one combined check to the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii.

## **Supporting loved ones during difficult times: AFTER passing (4)**

In addition to funeral and memorial services, a pre-cremation service with a final viewing is offered. This provides an opportunity for family and friends to be with their loved one's physical body one last time. The minister will impart the teachings of Amida Buddha, emphasizing the truth of impermanence and the profound connection in Amida's compassionate embrace, transcending physical separation with the departed.

Regarding memorials, a common question pertains to the counting of years, which can be confusing. For instance, why is the third year observed in the second year after passing? In the Jodo Shinshu tradition, memorials are observed on the 7th day (continuing every seventh week until the 49th day), the 49th day, 100th day, 1st, 3rd, 7th, 13th, 17th, 25th, 33rd, and 50th anniversaries. It is said that these observances are rooted in Chinese traditions, and customs, with a particular emphasis on the numbers three and five. To avoid confusion after the first year, it may be clearer to refer to these as 'times' rather than 'years.' Thus, the 'third time' refers to the counting method starting with the date of death as one, the first anniversary as the second time, and the year following (the second year) as the third time. While there are prescribed schedules for memorials, some families choose to hold memorials monthly (on the date of death), annually, or whenever the family can gather, continuing even beyond the 50th year, as memories and love endure, prompting the family to remember their deceased loved one.

As described in previous articles, memorials serve not only to honor the deceased but also to support the living who are left behind. Sometimes, families may choose to forgo a memorial service and instead make a donation to a temple in memory of their loved one, or they may not observe it at all. Ultimately, the decision rests with the family. It's important to consider that memorials offer a chance for families to gather, reconnect, and strengthen their bonds. Regrettably, we often meet people at funerals whom we haven't seen in life. While it's a somber occasion, it also provides an opportunity to meet and cherish our connections. Additionally, memorials are a time to reflect on our loved ones in the tranquility of a sacred space. Although family and friends may think of them often, setting aside dedicated time is significant. Ministers encourage families to remember their loved ones as guiding beings for those who remain.

Essentially, memorials offer a moment for the living to contemplate life and death, our current existence, and its inevitable end: what will happen when I take my last breath, and what will become of my family and friends? Memorials can be observed not only at temples but also in our own homes. They are like gifts from our loved ones, allowing us to lead enriched lives filled with compassion and wisdom through remembering our departed loved ones.
